Do you need internet service? The Governor wants to know!

In May, Governor McAuliffe announced a new initiative, RUOnlineVA, which gives Virginians an opportunity to log their need for Internet service. The goal of the initiative is to help the Governor and other policy makers understand where broadband is needed most.

Citizens in need of internet service are asked to log on and answer questions regarding their need. Responses will be mapped and shared with policy makers to stimulate broadband policy and funding discussions throughout the remainder of the administration.
